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HISTORY

Project Homeless Connect is part of a nationwide movement to:

- ★ *Increase access to services for people who are homeless or at risk of being homeless*
- ★ *Engage the community in finding a solution for homelessness*

Project Homeless Connect for Lane County is a local effort to:

- ★ *Improve access to services for people who are homeless or at risk of being homeless in Lane County*
- ★ *Offer our community one day and one location in which individuals and families who are without safe and stable homes can address basic needs and access critical services*
- ★ *Engage and increase the involvement of individual volunteers, the business and non-profit community to work together to provide access to services and long term solutions for people who are homeless*
- ★ *Provide a venue where the community can welcome its homeless citizens as neighbors*
- ★ *Leverage private, corporate and foundation money and in-kind support to augment city and county efforts to expand services for people who are homeless in Lane County*

Project Homeless Connect for Lane County was conceived by local community leaders who attended the 2006 Oregon Leadership Summit on Ending Chronic Homelessness. These individuals, representing private service providers, the Lane County Human Services Commission, Cities of Eugene and Springfield, and the United Way of Lane County, believed that this event would make an important contribution to the following initiatives:

The Lane County Ten Year Plan to End Chronic Homelessness, approved in November 2006 by the Lane County Board of Commissioners.

Helping the Homeless in Eugene, a Eugene City Council Goal. In 2007 Mayor Kitty Piercy appointed a “Blue Ribbon Committee” to seek financial support toward ending homelessness.

The City of Springfield’s standing commitment to provide for its most vulnerable citizens.

PROJECT HOMELESS CONNECT 2010

-A SNAPSHOT-

Project Homeless Connect for Lane County 2010 took place on Thursday, March 18th, 9:00am – 3:00pm at the Lane Events Center at the Fairgrounds in Eugene.

The event served **1,402** guests with the help of **228** cash and in-kind donors, **581** community volunteers and **301** service providers representing **106** nonprofits, government agencies and businesses.



The following is a sampling of services provided:



1,310 donated Census Bags with hygiene, personal products, socks and phone cards

1,600 personal and dental hygiene kits given away



2,670 meals served – breakfast and lunch

121 people received vouchers for eye glasses from Rainbow Optics

215 saw a doctor or nurse



639 people received housing related services

100 pets received veterinary exams



44 spay or neuter vouchers were distributed

Event demographics



41% of guests were women; 59% of guests were men.

72% came from Eugene, 18% from Springfield and 10% from elsewhere in Lane County



11% identified as veterans

2% were seniors 65 and older



9% of guests were under the age 18

32% of guests came to the event with a medical, dental or vision concern



78.5% **did not have** Oregon Health Plan or health insurance

36% of PHC guests spent the **previous night sleeping outdoors or in a car**

HOMELESSNESS IN LANE COUNTY

3,959 people were homeless in Lane County during the 2010 One Night Homeless Count. This number includes homeless community members on the streets, under bridges, in parks, at food pantries, day access centers, churches, emergency shelters, transitional housing and other locations (Lane County Human Services Commission 2010 One Night Homeless Count taken January 27, 2010). More than 100 staff and volunteers from 23 Lane County agencies administered the count. Of these 3,959 people:

- 2,503 were unsheltered either because they were turned away due to a lack of shelter availability or they were otherwise unable to access shelter.
- 1,451 individuals were part of family households with children.
- 284 homeless people identified themselves as veterans.
- 628 homeless people were counted in rural areas of Lane County.
- 1,084 identified themselves as chronically homeless.
- 201 individuals received American Recovery Act /Homeless Prevention/Rapid Re-housing funds for housing assistance to prevent homelessness or get homeless people back into housing as quickly as possible.



Homelessness: County-Funded Social Services

- 11,513 households who were homeless sought social services through Lane County Human Services Commission-funded programs during calendar year 2009.
- 442 unduplicated individuals were served at the Egan Warming Center during 13 nights of extreme weather at five faith-based sites this 2009-10 winter season.

Cost of Homelessness (updated Fall 2010, Lane County Human Services Commission) Homelessness affects all residents of Lane County because some people who are without shelter require costly support services:

- \$312 is the average cost of a visit to the Sacred Heart Hospital Emergency Department, RiverBend
- \$737 is the average daily cost of care at the Johnson Unit, Sacred Heart's acute psychiatric care facility, where the average stay is 6.5 days
- \$220 is the daily cost of in-patient detoxification services at Willamette Family Inc.'s Buckley Center, where treatment for alcohol takes 3-4 days and 5-8 days for heroin
- \$290 is the average cost of a visit to the McKenzie-Willamette Hospital Emergency Department
- \$94 is the daily cost for "housing" per inmate day at the Lane County Jail
- \$75 is the daily cost at the Springfield Municipal Jail
- \$49 is the daily cost for transitional and permanent housing for chronically homeless adults with a mental illness, using the housing first model of care
- \$51 is the average cost per person per day for emergency shelter for families (average household = 3.5 people at \$152 per day per household)



NEXT STEPS

The cycle of homelessness can be broken only through a comprehensive, community-wide approach that offers housing and human services to those in need. Coordinated planning and collaborative service delivery are essential to helping people avoid homelessness. The following goals have been identified as part of Lane County's Ten Year Plan to End Chronic Homelessness:

1. Prevent homelessness whenever possible. This can be done, in part, through the use of short-term rental and utility assistance to individuals and families at risk. When a household does move to homelessness, re-house them as quickly as possible.
2. Create new permanent housing beds for chronically homeless persons.
3. Increase the number of homeless persons staying in permanent housing.
4. Increase the number of homeless persons moving from temporary housing to permanent housing.
5. Increase employment among homeless persons.
6. Gather accurate and timely information about homelessness so that the community can identify people who are homeless and plan effective programs to end homelessness.

Project Homeless Connect encourages community members to take the following steps all year to help end homelessness in our community:

1. Volunteer with social service agencies and faith communities that work with homeless people. A list of local nonprofits seeking volunteers is available at www.unitedwaylane.org.
2. Donate used items, such as clothing, sleeping bags, coats, backpacks, and toiletries, to organizations that work with the homeless.
3. Make a tax-deductible contribution to a Lane County nonprofit organization.
4. Be an advocate for homeless or at-risk people with local, state and federal elected officials.
5. Educate people at your place of employment, civic groups, and social networks about the issues faced by homeless families and individuals. Let them know what they can do to help end homelessness.
